Bricklehampton Gates

The new style village gates have now been installed in Bricklehampton and we hope you agree that they look great. The designs were chosen by the community consultation back in the Summer of 2019. The gates were funded by a combination of grants from the County Council, The Police and Crime Commissioners Office and the balance from Parish Council reserves.

John Eaton Legacy Commemorative Bench

John Eaton a long-time resident and well known "Character" of Elmley Castle left a legacy to the Parish Council in his will. A small amount of that legacy remained when the new Parish Council was elected and, in consultation with John's family, we decided to spend it on a commemorative bench near the entrance to the Playing Fields and the planting of blue bells in the entrance.

Bricklehampton Phone Box

The refurbishment of the adopted phonebox in Bricklehampton is now complete and as you can see it is a great improvement. The residents of Bricklehampton were consulted on what the phone box should be used for. The results were:

- Leave empty – 24%
- House the Defibrillator – 29%
- Community book swap – 47%

The funding to add bookshelves to the back of the phonebox has been approved and work will start in the next few weeks.



Tree Removal & Re-planting

The removal of the dangerous Ash trees on the playing field was completed on schedule and the stumps were ground out to remove any trip hazards and make re-planting easier.

There were 100 responses to the Community Consultation concerning what tree species should be planted to replace the lost Ash trees. The results were:

Beech – 8%

Lime – 17%

Oak – 30%

Elm – 45%

So the Parish Council will be sourcing disease resistant Elm trees from Pershore College to plant on the playing field.



New Dog Waste Bins

We would like to thank Lisa Looker and Mick & Jane Moore for bringing to our attention the increasing problem of dog mess in the villages. Lockdown and Covid restrictions have brought more walkers to the villages, which means more dogs and unfortunately more mess.

The Parish Council had to go through a process to formally agree with Wychavon District Council suitable locations for new bins. This process has now been completed and we have installed three new dog waste bins in the villages.

The first is at the top of Hill Lane, just before the footpath starts to walk up the hill. The second is in Bricklehampton at the end of the Lane and the final one is located on Netherton Lane. These will be "adopted" and emptied by Wychavon refuse services.



undertaken quickly to stabilize and straighten the Cross. The work needs to be carried out by specialist heritage contractors and the estimated cost is around £15,000. The Parish Council have worked closely with Historic England and the County Council to set up a Section 17 agreement under The Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979 to secure grant funding for this work.

The Cross

After a structural survey and ongoing measurement by the Parish Council Historic England have now concluded that the lean of the Cross is both active and getting very close to the point of no return, where it will split or shatter.

The Cross has been put on the Ancient Monuments "At Risk" register and works need to be

Historic England will contribute 90% of the costs, the Highways department at Worcester County Council will contribute 5% and the Parish Council will only need to fund the remaining 5% of the total costs from reserves. (To a maximum of £1,000)

The Playground refurbishment

The “National lockdown” slowed the completion of the Elmley Castle Playground upgrade but it was successfully reopened in late August.

The works involved the major job of levelling the whole play area in order to remove the trip hazard caused by different ground levels. Then the old bark and deteriorating “soft-pour” surfaces were replaced with a new Cushion Fall loose impact absorbent surface (LIAS) across the whole play area.

The old swings where upgraded to a 1m diameter basket nest swing, which is proving very popular with children of all ages! Finally upgrading the plastic panels on the play tower to Sequoia timber panels with new artwork. We would like to thank the Staff and children of Elmley Castle First School for designing the new artwork on the panels. The children choose local features to highlight the many wonderful attractions of the Parish.

The total project cost was £13,000, but the Parish Council was able to obtain grant funding under the New Homes Bonus Scheme to cover £12,992. (The remaining £8 from Parish Council reserves)



Road Safety & Highways Maintenance

We are committed to improving the safety of our roads by reducing speeding, improving signage and keeping on top of pot-holes and road repairs



Discoloured Road Signs

All the discoloured road signs in the villages have now been replaced with new ones. These are easier for motorists to read and look a lot better!

Leak in Mill Lane

The long running saga of the leak alongside the Playing Field near the Mill Lane Millfield Junction has at last moved forward. For a long time, nobody would fix this because neither Severn Trent, nor the Highways department would accept responsibility.

The water was now been tested and it has been confirmed as rain/surface water and not from the Severn Trent Supply. It is now accepted that it is the Highways department's responsibility to investigate the cause and a full camera survey has been added to their schedule of works.

Grit Bins

The parish council provides additional green grit bins to supplement the yellow ones provided by the Highways Department at Worcestershire County Council. The Parish Council bins have been checked, topped up and are ready for winter.

The grit provided is for use on a self-help basis to clear public pavements and roads only. It is not for use on private property.

Please remember to use the grit sparingly, as it is expensive to purchase and can be damaging to the environment if used incorrectly. 10g of grit (rock salt) per metre square is sufficient to treat ice and light snow fall. 20g per square metre will treat up to 10cm of compacted snow.

LET'S S.C.R.A.P. FLY TIPPING!

We ALL have a DUTY OF CARE, to ensure our household or business waste is disposed of legally and not fly tipped. Avoid an UNLIMITED FINE by following the S.C.R.A.P. code:

- S**uspect ALL waste carriers
- C**heck with the Environment Agency on 03708 506 506 that the provider taking your waste away is licensed
- R**efuse unexpected offers to have waste taken away
- A**sk what will happen to your waste
- P**aperwork should be obtained – get a full receipt



Around two thirds of fly tips are household waste.

These are all examples of fly tipping which YOU could be fined or prosecuted for.

Be vigilant, report suspicious activity, share information through your local Neighbourhood Watch, stay safe and care for our community

Fly tipping

There are still incidents of fly tipping on the roads entering our villages. The incident shown here was at Netherton Lane in November of this year. If you see someone fly tipping write down as many relevant details as possible:

- A description of the people fly tipping
- Full description of any vehicle involved, especially the registration
- What was fly tipped
- What kind of view you had and whether anyone else was with you

- Do not approach the fly tipper
- Do not place yourself in danger

This should then be reported to Wychavon Client Services Team on 01386 565018 or via www.wychavon.gov.uk/flytipping If the fly tipping is blocking the road or represents a hazard to traffic then it should also be reported to the County Council Highways Department on 01905 765765

The Parish Council is working to positively influence all planning decisions that impact our villages.

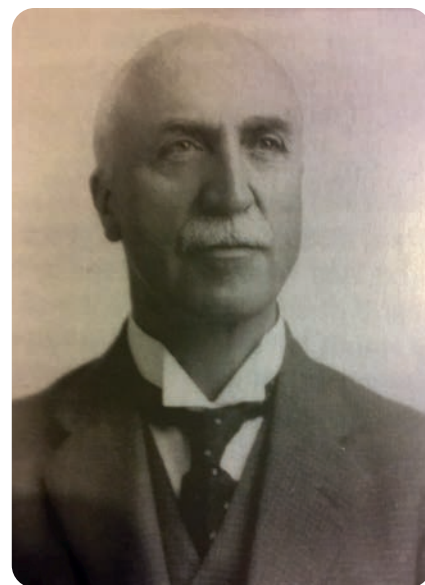
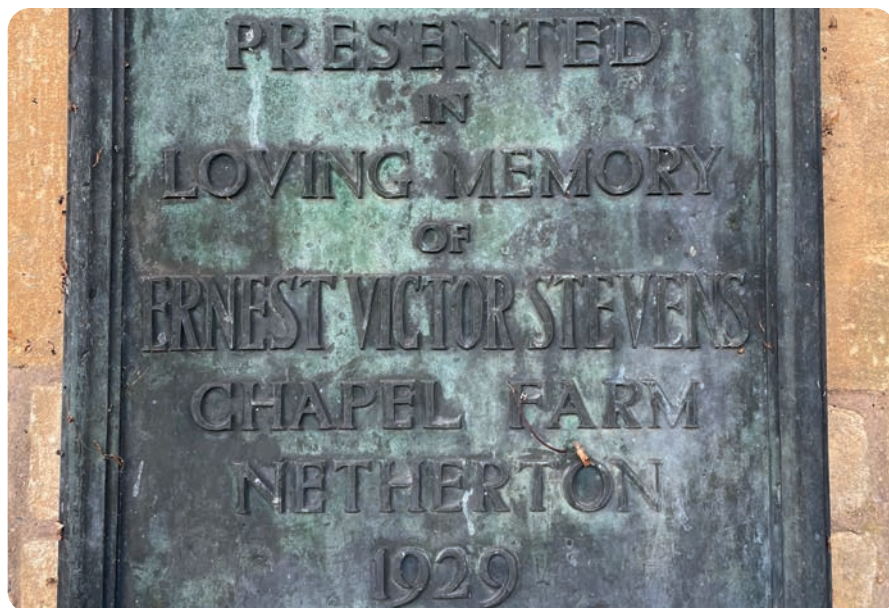


Assets of Community Value

The Parish Council has formally submitted requests to Wychavon District Council to secure “Asset of Community Value” status and legal protection for land and buildings in the Village which are important to the community. The Queen Elizabeth Pub already has protection and we are attempting to extend this to cover the Village Hall, The Playing Fields and the School. The initial response from Wychavon was that the Village

Hall and Playing Fields could meet the criteria for designation as assets of community value, but we are still awaiting final approval.

Unfortunately, the application for the School was rejected. It cannot be protected for the same reason as the Church. The building is a “Church of England holding” and therefore exempt from the disposal process of the Community of Assets Right to bid.



Ernest Stevens

Ernest Stevens & The Playing Field

The plaque by the entrance to the Elmley Castle Playing Field says that it was donated by Ernest Stevens, but most of us know very little about the story behind this generous gift.

Born 1867 in Lye near Stourbridge Ernest Stevens was educated locally before joining his father's business, which was then described as 'Bucket Makers'.

The factory for the business was built over old mine workings and suffered serious subsidence in the early 1890s. No compensation was available and after this crisis the family went their different ways. Ernest was determined to continue galvanising. In the early days he toured the markets of the Black Country with a horse and cart - earning himself the name Bucket King!

Realising that there was a demand for kitchen ware he went on from this to build up

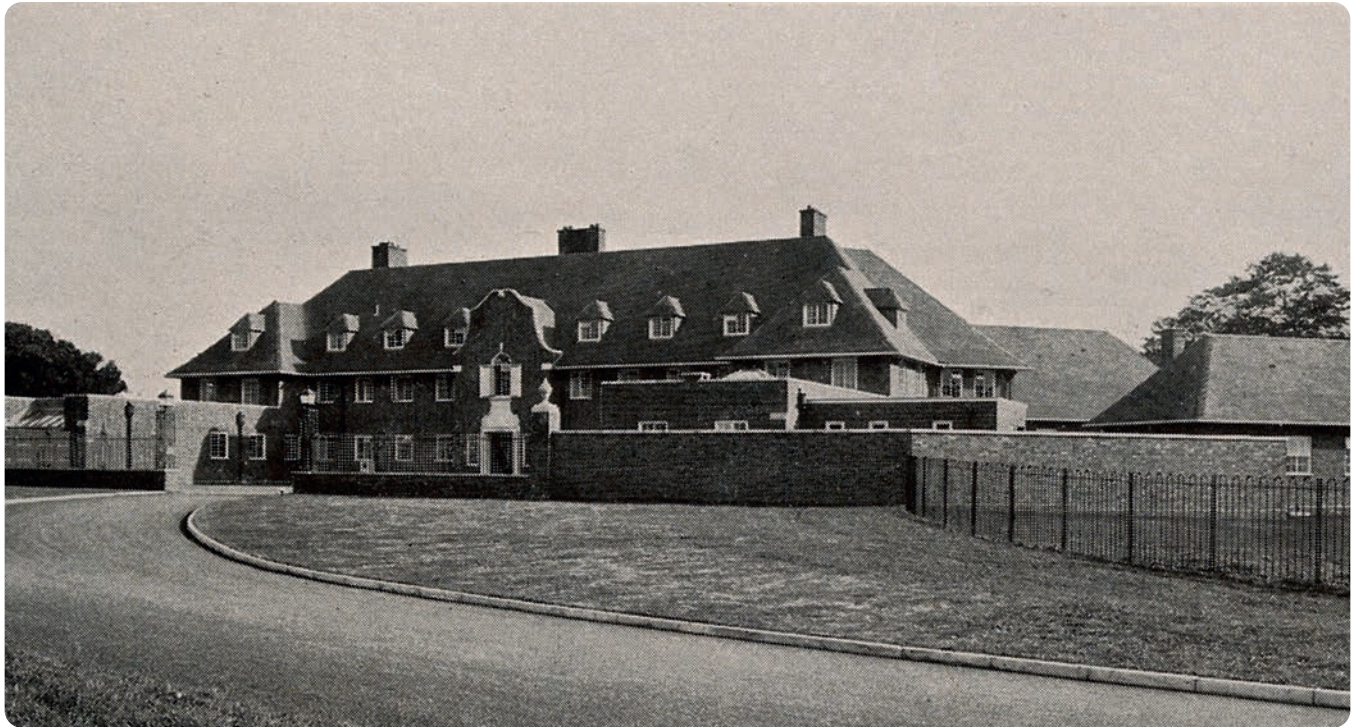
what became a well-known and successful company producing his own brand known as Judge kitchen ware.

He married Mary Collins, an advocate of temperance with a strong social concern for women and children who were suffering in the depression caused by the declining iron and mining industry. They were both

Sabbatarians and members of the Temperance movement, calling water Adams Ale! Ernest and Mary had 3 sons and 2 daughters. Victor, the eldest, caught TB at school but appeared to recover and went to a farm in Wiltshire to learn about farming. His father was easily persuaded to buy Chapel Farm at Netherton in 1916 to house a top herd of Hereford cattle

of which he was very proud. Considerable money was spent on modernising the farm buildings and house, with Alfred Long and company designing barns with blue brick floors and Belfast roofs, the latter necessitating importing massive timbers which had to be collected off trains from Hinton Station. Local people were very grateful for the work that he brought to the area during this time of agricultural depression. Ernest's family often came down to Chapel Farm at weekends with visitors and by all accounts he very much enjoyed this. Sadly, Victor's TB returned and he died in 1920. He was buried in Oldswinford church yard. His 2 brothers were by then dealing in wild fowl and there are family memories of seeing flamingos by the silos and humming birds in the bath room! They sold some birds to Peter Scott when he was building his own collection for Slimbridge.

But the business struggled, and they found that in spite of building extensive pens they really needed somewhere with more water and a more rural area so the farm was put up for sale. There was a considerable agricultural depression at the time and W.O.Steele took advantage of very favourable terms to buy the estate in 1935. Ernest wanted all children to have somewhere they could play freely, and to this end he gave play areas to many parts of the Black Country. It is therefore perhaps not surprising that he bought the turnip field in the middle of Elmley Castle for a playing field to be established in memory of his son. The deed reads 'for the free use of children'. A later Deed was altered so that land not needed for the children was to be free for adults and dogs on leads! Ernest Stevens died in 1957, by which time the company's products had been overtaken

by cheaper imports; it ceased production in about the same year.

He left an amazing legacy of donations to the Stourbridge area, such as Mary Stevens Park in memory of his wife which is still much used today and Mary Stevens Home which is now a hospice.

Burglary prevention – keep homes and

In one out of three burglaries thieves do not have to use force getting into the property through an open door or window.

Follow these simple steps to help reduce the chance of becoming a victim.



Doors and windows

In about a third of burglaries, thieves gain access through an open window or door. Make sure doors and windows are kept locked when you go out, and close them even when you leave a room, particularly during hot weather.

Check the condition of door frames and glass panels to make sure they are secure.



Light and alarms

When you are out, leave a light on to give the impression there is somebody at home.

A light timer switch is fairly cheap to buy and can be easily fitted to operate radios and lights when you are out, giving burglars the impression that somebody is in.

Don't forget – if you have an alarm on your house use it.



Your chances of becoming a victim of crime are low - but by following our simple advice you can reduce your chances even further

Car key burglary

Sometimes people will try to break into houses simply to steal your car keys.

- Never leave car keys in open view of your letterbox or ground floor windows
- Ensure car keys are not within reach and can not be "fished" from letterbox or window
- Because it is the car keys the thief wants, when at home at night DO leave them downstairs, do not take them upstairs with you. If they are persistent enough to break-in it is best they take the keys and go

Shed and gardens

Make sure sheds and garages are locked and secure. Always tidy away your garden tools and lock ladders away to stop a burglar using them.

Use a good quality padlock on your shed to protect your property inside it.

You can also buy a shed alarm cheaply from most DIY stores.

Mark your property with smartwater and if police recover it we will be able to identify the owner and return it.

Community Ultrafast Broadband Project



The current broadband service in our area is simply not good enough for the ever-growing number of services being delivered via the internet. TV via Netflix, Amazon Prime and catch up services, music from Spotify and Internet radio along with online gaming are using up the available capacity. There is currently no central government plan for improvement in rural areas and as technology moves forward the demands on the current broadband infrastructure are only going to grow and our existing services will get slower over time.

As a result, the Parish Council in conjunction with residents is looking to undertake a Community Project, supported by the Superfast Worcestershire Broadband Team, to bring the ultrafast broadband network to our community.

This network, delivered via a fibre to the premises

infrastructure, will offer speeds of up to 1,000 megabits (depending on a chosen package) and virtually unlimited capacity for future needs.

The upgrade would cost you nothing, thanks to UK government funding. It may even increase your property value through access to this future proofed network. All it requires is individual households and businesses to come together as a community. The grants are calculated based on £1,500 per private residence that signs up and £3,500 per local business that signs up

Ultra-Fast Broadband

The new Ultrafast broadband network, delivered by a fibre to the premises infrastructure, will offer speeds of up to 1,000 Mbps and almost unlimited capacity. Bringing this technology infrastructure into the villages is expensive, but the Parish Council, working with local residents and the Superfast Worcestershire Broadband Scheme is working on a scheme to have it funded entirely by government grants. Funding is available up to £1,500 per household and £3,500 per business that signs up. You are not committed to anything by signing, just helping to get the grant funding in place.
